## FIRST LETTER OF NEW PROJECT

As this new project of the Southern Far East Mission is begun, let us all consider its affects on our lives, on the, mission, and on those who will be given contact with the Gospel through its messages.

First: We who are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are such because we possess a testimony of the divinity of the Book of Mormon, a testimony of the mission of the Joseph Smith, and a sure knowledge of the sacrifice of Jesus Christ to Atone for our sins and open the way for our return to God our Father in Heaven. In our daily activities in whatever we do, there are many occasions to recall to mind the responsibility of one who has such a testimony. growth during your stay in this Mission. We offer you our services in any difficulty that may arise and ask that we be made part of your work here in the Mission. A great blessing has been given to each of us through the Gospel. Treasure the testimony you now possess as your most valuable possession and work to improve it's value. Become a companion of the Lord and permit Him to bless you. Give of your happiness to others and of your hope for the future to those who need the uplift of hope. Above all, remain true to the knowledge you have of the Gospel. God will bless you for your faithfulness in keeping His commandments. We must all admit that we need the blessings of the Lord each day. These blessings will come to us through obedience to the laws of God.
